

# **PROGRAM NOTES**

#### **Fern Hill** (1961)

Fern Hill is one of John Corigliano's earliest works, written shortly after he completed his musical studies at Columbia University. Dedicated to Bella Tillis, one of his teachers at Midwood High School in Brooklyn, it is a setting of a text by Welsh poet Dylan Thomas (1914–1953). Fern Hill was first performed at Carnegie Recital Hall shortly before Christmas of 1961.

The Dylan Thomas poem takes its title from a real place, a farm called "Fernhill" in the west part of Wales. It was owned by Thomas' uncle and aunt, but was more of a working farm than any sort of shrine to pastoral beauty. The mood of Fern Hill is one of longing, an idealized account of a lost childhood. It was written in 1945, by which time Thomas was in his thirties. Many commentators have sought to find out more about the influences upon it, and about its meaning. It seems, however, neither a straightforward piece of nostalgia nor a clear recollection of any particular summer, and sometimes its phrases give up their meaning only with difficulty, as in "Nothing I cared, in the lamb white days, that time would take me up to the swallow thronged loft by the shadow of his hand;" or the final couplet, "Time held me green and dying, though I sang in my chains like the sea." One writer has described Thomas as "a compulsive linguistic gambler," and the idea of the poet, in Fern Hill, taking risks with language in the same way that a gambler does with his money is an intriguing one.

Corigliano himself has spoken of the work as follows: "Fern Hill was written when I was much more innocent musically. The language that I loved at the time was the American language of Copland, Barber and Bernstein. I adapted it, utilized it, learned from it and then added other ways of speaking." It is easy to spot the folksy, American-landscape-inspired style of Copland in Fern Hill, right from its opening. Copland was certainly a Corigliano fan, describing him as a very talented composer and saying, in the early 1980s, "John may be the new me." (No doubt with his tongue firmly in his cheek.) The influence of Bernstein, twenty years Corigliano's senior, is more difficult to make out, though Bernstein's insistence that tonality still had a place in the music of his time would likely have resonated with the Corigliano of the early 1960s.

## MEET THE ARTISTS



Hanqian Zhu's early piano studies began at the Primary School of the Shanghai Conservatory of Music. After graduating from the Conservatory's Middle School, she studied on scholarship with Prof. Yoshikazu Nagai from 2008 to 2015 at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, where she received the BM, MM, and Professional Studies Diplomas. She is currently a Doctor of Musical Arts candidate at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, studying

with Dr. Timothy Ehlen.

She has presented many recitals and performed in festivals in China and the United States, including the Sherman Clay Solo Recital Series in the Bay Area in 2011, PianoTexas 2011, Shanghai-San Francisco Celebration Concerts in both Shanghai and San Francisco in 2010, and Ravel's Piano Concerto for the Left Hand with the San Francisco Conservatory Orchestra in 2010. Since the age of 15, she has regularly appeared in the Shanghai Symphony Orchestra's Weekly Chamber Concert. In 2006, she performed in the orchestra's Mozart Anniversary Series. Hanqian Zhu has won many international prizes, including the 21st Century Piano Commission Award, first prize of the Strum Page Piano Competition in 2012, fifth prize in the Julia Crane International Piano Competition in 2006, and first prize in the San Francisco Conservatory's 2009 Concerto Competition. She was a finalist at the 2011 Kosciuszko Chopin Competition in New York.

Besides being a soloist, she is also a devoted collaborative pianist. She has participated in chamber music activities since middle school and won the second prize in the Chamber Music Competition of Shanghai Conservatory in 2006. With intensive chamber music training at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, she enjoyed numerous collaborative performances every year. During 2013–2015 she was a member of New Music Ensemble of San Francisco Conservatory under Director Nicole Paiement and joined in special seasonal performances, including playing the orchestral reduction of three rarely performed modern operas. She is currently on the student accompanying staff at UIUC.



A recent addition to the BACH ensemble, **Kathy Kew Lee** is an avid singer who has performed as a soloist, member, and section leader of many choirs including the UIUC Chamber Singers, VOCE in Hartford, CT, the Yale Camerata and Chamber Choir, Vocal Arts Ensemble of Durham, Boston's Cantata Singers, and numerous church choirs. Since graduating from Brown University with a Bachelor of Arts in Music and Psychology, Kathy has taught voice lessons and performed in various venues as a soloist. During her

time at Brown, she received the Brown University Music Faculty Premium award and first place at the Rhode Island National Association of Teachers of Singing for three consecutive years. While in Boston, Kathy worked with the PALS Children's Chorus as conductor of their youngest choir, as well as vocal coach for musical theater and special projects. Aside from singing with BACH, Kathy's favorite musical collaborations are those she shares with her twin sister, husband, and two sons.



**Kasey Stewart**, a native of Plattsburgh, NY, is a Professor of Voice at Millikin University in Decatur, Illinois. She is also a third year DMA Candidate in Vocal Performance and Literature at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. She received both her BA in Music and her MM in Vocal Performance from Binghamton University, in Binghamton, NY.

Kasey has performed leading roles with the University of Illinois Lyric Theater, Lyric Opera Cleveland, Tri-

Cities Opera, the Binghamton Philharmonic, and with A Singing Actor's Studio with Jake and Jill Gardner. She made her European debut in August 2015 at the International Gilbert and Sullivan Festival in Harrogate, England. Most recently, she was an Assistant Professor of Voice Performance in the Whalen School of Music at Ithaca College, in Ithaca, NY. Kasey is an awardwinning vocal artist and active performer with recent concerts at the University of Illinois, the National Opera Theater, and the Newport Summer Music Festival. Her most recent appearances were as the mezzo soloist in Stephen Taylor's *Transfiguration* and as alto soloist in Beethoven's *9th Symphony*, with the University of Illinois Symphony Orchestra. Her next appearance is as alto soloist in Beethoven's *9th Symphony* with the Decatur Symphony Orchestra on March 3, 2018.



Jonathan Young is Director of Music at the Catholic Church of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross in Champaign, Illinois, and is pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ performance and literature at the University of Illinois, where he studies with Dr. Dana Robinson. Originally from Moses Lake, Washington, Jonathan holds a Bachelor of Music degree in organ performance from Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Washington, and a

Master of Music degree in organ performance and literature from the Eastman School of Music. Jonathan was the Alternate Winner of the 2011 Mu Phi Epsilon International Competition, held in conjunction with the fraternity's triennial convention in Rochester, New York. From 2014–2017, Jonathan was Director of Music and Organist at First Presbyterian Church of Urbana, and from 2011–2014 Director of Music at the Catholic Church of the Immaculate Conception in Mattoon, Illinois. Prior to this, he was a Senior Lecturer and Visiting University Organist at PLU for the 2009–2010 academic year. He has served churches in many denominations as an organist and choir director, including military chapels (Joint Base Lewis-McChord), Methodist, Episcopal, Presbyterian, Lutheran, and Catholic congregations.



# MEET THE MUSIC DIRECTOR



A person of diverse artistic interests, **Joseph Baldwin** is a conductor whose primary work explores the integration of choral music, dynamic programming and presentation, the conductor as servant leader, and the transformative power of community engagement. He has a keen interest in arts and non-profit leadership at the academic and professional levels.

In 2017, Joseph was appointed as Music Director of the Baroque Artists of Champaign Urbana (BACH),

succeeding Chester L. Alwes. From 2012-2015, Joseph served on the faculty at Smith College (MA), where he was the Iva Dee Hiatt Distinguished Assistant Director of Choral Activities and taught full-time in the Department of Music. He has held key appointments with the University of Massachusetts Amherst as a Visiting Professor of Music, Berkshire Choral International as a Staff Conductor, the Grammy® Award-winning choral ensembles at the University of Michigan, and the choirs of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. An active guest conductor and collaborator, he has enjoyed conducting engagements with SongFest at The Colburn School and the Five College New Music Festival (MA) as well as conducting fellowships with the Oregon Bach Festival (as a member of the renowned Master Class in Conducting) and the Yale School of Music — Norfolk Chamber Music Festival. Joseph is passionate about contemporary music and regularly partners with thriving composers, including Dominick DiOrio and Anne LeBaron. A strong advocate for the choral arts at all levels, Joseph is an active guest clinician and adjudicator with ensembles in the professional/young artist, collegiate, secondary, and spiritual settings.

Joseph is pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts in Choral Music at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He received the Master of Music in Conducting from the University of Michigan, where he studied with Jerry Blackstone. At Northwestern University, Joseph graduated with the Bachelor of Music (cum laude), with additional studies toward a Bachelor of Arts in the five-year double-degree program. He is also a dedicated student of yoga, currently practicing at Lois Steinberg's B.K.S. Iyengar Yoga Institute of Champaign-Urbana.
